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Foreword by Sir Salamo Injia, Kt, GCL, Chief Justice and Chairman



The Papua New Guinea Centre for Judicial Excellence (PngCJE) was established in 2010 under a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) entered into between the Chief Justice, Chief Magistrate and the Secretary for the Department of Justice and Attorney General. Its aim is for PngCJE to deliver structured training programs for Judges, Magistrates, Court officers and other officers of the Law and Justice Sector (LJS) agencies that play a part in the Court process. Judges and support personnel receive professional development through the Centre for Judicial Excellence which has been established in 2010 for the purpose of satisfying the local needs of the Judiciary. The Centre for Judicial excellence also aims to offer services to other Judiciaries in neighbouring Pacific Island Countries should they wish to participate.

For 2017, the PngCJE completed 31 training activities which demonstrates its commitment to providing judicial education in Papua New Guinea (PNG). This is a milestone as we seek to increase our capacity to provide services locally and regionally. In this vein, we appointed our first Executive Director, Mr John Carey who is a lawyer from the Cayman Islands and brings a wealth of experience and has the international credibility and recognition that will augur well for enhancing our judicial education programs. Mr Carey's responsibilities includes, managing training and education programs run by PNGCJE for judges, magistrates, court staff of the high courts and magisterial services, lawyers and officers of the Law and Justice sector.

Mr Carey will also assist the PNG judiciary to develop PngCJE into a regional training centre for the Pacific judiciaries by 2020 in line with a decisions by chief justices of the Pacific during the Pacific judicial conference held in 2016.

As we look forward to enhancing the ability of the PngCJE to meet the judicial education needs of our local judiciary there will be a more structured approach in the design, delivery and execution of training. A Training Needs Assessment will be conducted which will inform on the curriculum strategy. Ultimately, the role of judicial education is to build professional competence as we seek to engender public trust and confidence in Justice, the Courts and our Judges.

I wish to thank the Board of Directors of the PngCJE for their yeoman's job in providing guidance and direction in the delivery of judicial education in PNG. With their energy and drive I look forward to an even more successful set of outcomes in 2018 and beyond.

Introduction

The PngCJE has full responsibility for the provision of judicial education and training programs for the Papua New Guinean judiciary. Since its formation in 2010, the PngCJE has conducted and/or coordinated judicial training in Papua New Guinea which aim to improve knowledge, skills and attitudes. Training for our Judges are designed, delivered and evaluated by our Judges who are a significant component of our Faculty of Trainers.

The Chief Justice of Papua New Guinea, Sir Salamo Injia, Kt, GCL has been a strong proponent of judicial education locally and regionally and has provided significant resources to develop and grow the PngCJE. The PngCJE is working on having a dedicated learning area which will be introduced in 2018. Moreover, the development of our training program strategies which have involved Face-to-face (F2F) will expand to include publications and ICT.

The PngCJE has responsibility for delivering on a range of topics in judicial skills and knowledge.

These include but are not limited to:

- Judgment Writing
- Judicial Ethics
- Human Rights
- Evidence Matters
- Assessment of witnesses
- Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR)
- Sentencing
- Judicial Orientation
- Leadership
- Courtroom Management

As the PngCJE enhances its capacity and streamlines the programs that are currently offered, the transition to the regional role will become more evident.

Reports

Brief Background on the Trainings Conducted in 2017

1. Basic Judicial Orientation Course For Judges, 29 – 30 March 2017

The Judicial Orientation Course for Judges (newly appointed) has been a yearly activity for the Judiciary through the PNG Centre for Judicial Excellence. The Workshop is considered important and conducted for new judges once they are appointed to the bench. It is part of the ongoing professional development programs designed and delivered by the PngCJE for Judicial Officers.

2. Judgement Writing Workshop for Magistrates, 18 – 19 May 2017

Judgement Writing is an essential part of the work magistrates perform as judicial officers. As such judgement writing skills training is important. In realizing the need for improved judgment writing, the workshop was planned in consultation with the National Judicial College of Australia to deliver the relevant skills training and the result that it was a successful workshop. Magistrates have indicated that they benefited greatly from the workshop.

3. Judicial Orientation Course for Magistrates, 4 – 9 June 2017

The Judicial Commission of New South Wales has worked with the Local Court of New South Wales to deliver the New South Wales Magistrates Orientation Program almost annually since 1990. The Program has been modified each year in response to feedback received to ensure that it better meets the needs of new magistrates. The Judicial Commission of New South Wales signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the PNG Magisterial Service in August 2007. The objective of the program was to:

- a) Provide information about the principles and the practice of being a magistrate in PNG, in particular covered,
 - Confronting Biases, attitudes and values
 - Behaviour in and out of court (within the context of being a judicial officer)
 - Judicial ethics
 - Expectation of Judicial peers
 - Assessing/analysing one's own performance in court as well as comparing this with the others' performance
 - Learning effective communication and patience
 - Judicial skills including decision making, diary keeping and time management
 - Outlining best practice standards
 - Sentencing principles (taking into account all of the above)
 - Stress management
 - Court craft.

- b) To provide opportunities for PNG magistrates to practise their court craft skills and receive constructive feedback about them in order to identify strengths and areas for improvement.
- c) To provide a network of senior and newly appointed magistrates upon which to draw, when needed.

4. Election Petition Workshop for Judges, 13 – 14 July 2017

The Election Petition workshop is conducted once every five years parallel to the National General Election of PNG to enhance skills for judges and registry staff.

The last Election Petition (EP) workshop hosted was in 2012 which helped the Judiciary fast track most, if not all EP cases before the 2017 National General Election.

5. Provincial Judge Administrators workshop, 12 July 2017

The Conduct of this workshop was an important avenue for the provincial and Resident Judges, Associates and A/Rs and AOs to enhance their understanding in the operation and management of certain changes to the NJS administration being initiated.

This workshop provided some important aspects in the following subject areas. They were:

- The operation and management of NJS Imprest System;
- The Human Resource Administration, Recruitment, Removals and Discipline of NJS Staff;
- Registry Administration Roles of Assistant Registrars in Sub Registry locations;
- Roles of Judge Administrators in Case Management.

6. Case Management and Information Technology (CMIT) Workshop, 10 – 11 July 2017

The Introduction of the PNG Judiciary's digital data base systems have been an initiative of the Chief Justice Sir Salamo Injia. The PNG Judiciary has successfully introduced some of these integrated data base systems such as the ICCDS. This was the third CMIT workshop.

7. Lukautim Pikinini Act Consultations Workshop, 24 – 27 October 2017

The Lukautim Pikinini Act was passed by Parliament in 2016 and came into effect in March 2017. The Regulation under this legislation also came into effective.

The Chief Magistrate established a Technical Committee which was tasked to develop practice and procedure for the effective implementation of the LPA Act and Regulation. The best way to do this was to develop a set of Rules and a check list to be used by the

Magistrates and Clerk which would promote consistency in the implementation of the Act and the Regulation.

8. <u>Human Rights Workshop for Magistrates, 23 -24 November 2017</u> <u>Human Rights Workshop for Judges, 30 – 1 December 2017</u>

A visit of the PJSI Human Rights Adviser was scheduled for 20 November – 1 December 2017. It was agreed that the part of this visit, the Human Rights Adviser would be the primary facilitator of a series of two workshops, one for District Court Magistrates, and the other for National Court Judges auspice as a joint initiative of the PJSI and the PNG Centre of Judicial Excellence.

As these were the first ever court workshops to be held in PNG on the subject of human rights, it was agreed that their primary purposes would be to highlight the relevance of human rights to the courts' work and to identify the roles and responsibility of judges and magistrates to apply human rights across all areas of the courts' work. These introductory workshops generated discussions and recommendations that enabled the identification of more specific needs and led to a more detailed ongoing work plan of human rights related trainings, complimented by other human rights strengthening initiatives throughout the courts.

9. <u>Pacific Judicial Strengthening Initiative Regional Lay Judicial Officer Orientation</u> <u>Course, 20 – 24 November, 2017</u>

The PJSI – Regional Lay Judicial Orientation workshop was held in Honiara, Solomon Islands. The Workshop was one of the many workshops held by the Pacific Judicial Strengthening Initiative within the Pacific. The Initiative is funded by New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade which has supported promoting the rule of law across the Pacific over recent years.

The goal of the Pacific Judicial Strengthening Initiative (PJSI) is to build fairer societies by supporting the courts in 14 Pacific Islands Countries (PICs) to develop more accessible, just, efficient and responsive justice services. These PICs are the Cook Island, Federated States of Micronesia, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Nauru, Niue, Palau, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Solomon Island, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu. Re-inclusion of Fiji in PJSI activities will also be explored over the course of the Initiative at MFAT's direction.

Transition to Pacific Islands Countries Centre for Judicial Excellence (PicCJE)

The PngCJE commenced work to establishing a regional centre for judicial excellence for the Pacific Islands (PicCJE) to be based in Papua New Guinea. The decision to explore establishing PicCJE was made in a meeting of the Chief Justices of the region during the Pacific Judicial Conference held in Port Moresby in September 2016. The PngCJE has a roadmap to achieve full establishment of PicCJE by the end of 2020. By then, PngCJE would be

capable of becoming a regional centre that would meet the domestic needs of PNG Courts and those of regional Pacific Islands Courts.

Memorandum of Understanding Between The Supreme and National Courts of Justice of Papua New Guinea and The High Court of Appeal of Solomon Islands on Judicial Cooperation

The Signing of the MOU between the Supreme and National Court of Justice of Papua New Guinea and the High Court of Appeal of Solomon Islands on Judicial Cooperation occurred in Port Moresby on the 22 August 2017.

The purpose of this is to:

- a) Identify activities to be conducted during the remainder of the life of the MOU; and
- b) Set out mechanism for consultations, administration and implementation for this program during 2017 2018

Memorandum of Understanding between the Supreme and National Courts of Justice of Papua New Guinea and the University of the South Pacific

The Signing of the MOU between the Supreme and National Court of Justice of Papua New Guinea and the University of the South Pacific occurred in Port Moresby on the 04th of September, 2017.

Under the MOU agreement the Parties will cooperate in supporting the Pacific Legal Information Institute (PacLii) and in particular to:

- a) Maintain and enhance PacLii;
- b) Conduct programmes relevant to the on-going improvement of PacLii; and
- c) Abide by the prescribed principles of PacLii and the Free Access to Law Movement as specified in the Declaration on Free Access to Law, Montreal 2002.


